

### **2023 Operating Budget**

### **Board of Health Approved Budget 2023**

# The Board of Health approved 2023 cost-shared\* operating budget for Public Health Sudbury & Districts is \$28,549,210

#### Total cost-shared budget compared with 2022:

- 1.43% increase (\$402,528)
- 0% increase provincial base funding
  - Same provincial mitigation grant and unorganized territories funding
- 3.75% increase municipal funding (\$340,428)
  - \$3.17 annual per person increase (\$58.43)

#### City of Greater Sudbury compared with 2022:

• 3.17% increase (\$247,793)

\*Shared between province and municipalities at up to 70% provincial; excludes 100% provincially funded programs; excludes extraordinary COVID-19 expenses








### **COVID-19 in Sudbury and districts**

- As of January 11, 2023 (2pm), our region has seen 21 636 reported cases of COVID-19 and 197 COVID-related deaths.
- Almost three quarters of those cases (71%) and deaths (75%) occurred in 2022.

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### **Opportunity Costs**

Since March 2020:


- Diversion of 25% to 85% of cost-shared budget to COVID-19 (adjusted to response intensity)
- Stopped or radically reduced most other public health programs and services

Mutli-year diversion of resources:

- Cumulative backlog of public health programs and services
- Growing and unmet community needs

### **Funding Context and Budget 2023**

### Public Health Funding Framework Health Protection and Promotion Act

### **Obligated municipalities:**


• Shall pay the expenses incurred by or on behalf of the board of health [or MOH] of the health unit in the performance of its functions and duties under this or any other Act.

### **Boards of health:**

• Shall give annually to each obligated municipality in the health unit notice


### **The Minister:**

• May make grants for the purposes of this Act on such conditions as he or she considers appropriate.

### **2023 Budget Assumptions**

- 1. Provincial **mitigation grant** (\$1 179 500) available in 2023, offsetting municipal costs associated with provincial funding policy change announced in 2019 (same level as 2020, 2021, and 2022).
- 2. Base provincial funding in 2023 will include the 1% increase announced in 2022.
- 3. Any increase in expenses must be covered by municipal funds.
- 4. Continued availability of provincial funds to cover **extraordinary COVID-19 costs** if cost-shared base budget cannot cover.
- 5. With no enhancements, **fixed costs** continue to increase at approximately \$550,000 per year. Canada's inflation rate year over year was 6.9% in September.
- 6. Significant impact of COVID-19 response on our **workforce** has resulted in higher levels of leaves, resignations, and retirements.
- 7. Intensification of **community needs** for Public Health programs and services (e.g. pandemic response; recovery priorities; compliance with *Health Protection and Promotion Act;* full scope of Ontario Public Health Standards).



### 2023 Budget Work-up

### **Starting point**

- \$640K shortfall
  - \$682K increase in expenditures
  - \$42K increase in provincial funding to reflect full year 1% increase announced in 2022

### Mitigation

- Balanced budget
  - \$340K municipal increase (\$3.17/person/year)
  - \$20K increase in interest revenue
  - \$276K cost reduction initiatives
