Open Air Burning Legislation in the Province of Ontario

 The Fire Protection and Prevention Act provides authority to the Fire Chief of a Municipality to establish a by-law, with the approval of Council, that governs open air fires









Open Air Burning By-Law 2016 – A Modern Approach to Public Fire Safety

History

- At amalgamation, the seven Fire Departments had a variety of unique open-air burning policies
- Sudbury Fire Department model was adopted
 - Primarily respond to complaints
 - Permissive
 - Reactive
 - A "right"









Recent Changes to the User Fees By-law

- Request for Decision regarding P6M initiative
 Open Air Burning Permits
 - November 17, 2015 Presentation to Finance & Administration Committee
 - Minutes adopted by Council December 15, 2015
- Miscellaneous User Fees By-law including the Open Air Burning fee schedule approved by Council December 15, 2015









Key Differences – Current By-law vs. Proposed By-law

Current By-Law 2009-132

- Current measurement is 6m from any combustible
- Onus on owner for compliance
- No fee required
- Results in a reactive Fire Services (FS) complaint based response

Proposed By-Law 2016-....

- New measurements are 3m, 4m, 5m, dependant upon device and verified by FS
- Onus on FS in collaboration with owner for compliance
- \$50 fee required initially,
 \$25 renewal annually
- Proactive service provided to ensure safety by FS

Smoke Alarms and Carbon Monoxide Use

 As part of the CGS Open Air Burning Program, the Burning Permit site review by Fire Services will provide the opportunity to review the installation/maintenance of required smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors while at the residence if requested by the applicant









- The **Burning Permit** Process
 - a four-tiered approach to the issuance of a Burning Permit will be used:
 - Application online or at Citizen Service Centres
 - Payment online or at Citizen Service Centres
 - 3. Site Inspection by Fire Services
 - 4. Permit Issued by Fire Services









Site Inspection

- The Site Inspection will be conducted within seven days when possible.
- 2. A successful assessment will result in a Burning Permit being issued on the spot.
- 3. An unsuccessful assessment will result in a Burning Permit <u>not</u> being issued.










- Site Inspection will review the following items
 - 1. The general rules of the By-law:
 - ✓ What to burn
 - ✓ Supervising the fire
 - ✓ Equipment and resources to extinguish the fire
 - ✓ Weather conditions
 - ✓ Complaints
 - ✓ Ensuring clearances are met











3 metres to combustibles,
 only a small chiminea fire
 permitted

4 metres to combustibles, a barrel or smaller fire permitted

5 metres tocombustibles, a campfireor smaller fire permitted









Communicating the Change

Public Communication

- Stress the proactive approach to safety of the citizens/neighbours and the responders
- Fire Services streamlines process, ensures Fire
 Service has permitted fire addresses in records
 management system for real time information
- Partner with Corporate Communications, the radio and television media future communication
