2010 Cost-Shared Operating Budget Summary

- Total of \$21,926,091
 - > 1.0% overall increase over 2010
 - 2.2% municipal levy increase
 - 2.5% provincial grant increase
 - Loss of PHRED Program (-\$300,000)
 - 5% unorganized territories grant increase
 - 36% municipal CINOT decrease
- Within a context of fiscal constraint:
 - Maintains 2010 service level
 - Incorporates salary freezes
 - Maintains critical public health capacity

Public Health Funding Process Legislative Basis

Boards of Health approve the budget:

...shall give annually to each obligated municipality in the health unit a written notice...of the amount that the board of health estimates will be required to defray the expenses...[required for the performance of the board's functions and duties]

Municipalities are required to pay:


...shall pay the expenses incurred by or on behalf of the board of health [or MOH] of the health unit in the performance of its functions and duties under this or any other Act.

The Minister may make grants:

...may make grants for the purposes of this Act on such conditions as he or she considers appropriate.

Total 2011 Budget Cost-Shared and 100% Provincial




MOHLTC – Funding Trends

Budget Background

New Ontario Public Health Standards approved and effective January 1, 2009 requiring more evidence-informed practice

Budget Breakdown

Breakdown of 1.0% overall increase:

- 2.72% to maintain programs including common cost drivers such as negotiated settlements, staff movement on salary grids, pension & benefits
- **-1.72%** reduction to operating expenditures
