  - 36 clinics successfully operating across U.S.A
  - Spay Central in Newmarket opening Dec 2008, first Canadian Clinic
  - Assistance given for fundraising, staffing, volunteers, training, clinic blueprints and equipment and supplies

# Services provided by Spay/Neuter Sudbury

- Spays and Neuters for dogs and cats
  - \$50.00 for each neuter, dog or cat
  - \$75.00 for each spay, dog or cat
  - \$15.00 city tag registration for all animals

- Owner surrendered animals
- Strays at large in Greater Sudbury
- Greater Sudbury Animal Control/SPCA Stats
  - Citizens complaints of property damages and nuissance animals

# How a Spay/Neuter Clinic will help the community of Sudbury

- Heath and safety of animals and residents
- Assisting surrounding areas
- Keep business in Sudbury
- Job creation and revenue from tag sales
- Helping local animal groups

#### The Solution

Most open admission shelters have to euthanize about 75% of their animals – this stat is lower for dogs but higher for cats. No kill shelters have considerably lower kill rates - but what happens is that the euthanizing is being "downloaded" to area pounds. When no-kill shelters are full, unwanted animals have to go somewhere. But this could change. The City Council of Greater Sudbury has the ability to almost eliminate the euthanizing of unwanted and abandoned cats and dogs – simply by backing the establishment of a \$50 spay neuter clinic, as spay/neuter costs have since risen dramatically. Thus ... well, you get the picture. We know what doesn't work. This is the current system of controlling the companion animal population by euthanizing. It's miserable for everyone involved. What does work is A SPAY/NEUTER CLINIC. In fact, it's the only thing that DOES work.
