



Additionally, Black Lives Matter Sudbury demands the Greater City of Sudbury and Council to <u>provide space/resources in the form of free access to The Greater Sudbury Area funded and run spaces such as but not limited to Community Centres.</u>



#### **City of Greater Sudbury Mission & Vision**

- "We build and foster a welcoming city that offers outstanding opportunity, wellness and value."
- → "A centre of excellence and opportunity a vibrant community of communities living together."

#### **City of Greater Sudbury Shortcomings**

- → A lower percentage of Sudbury and districts population had completed a university education of bachelor's degree or higher (19%) compared to Ontario (32%). (Public Health Sudbury) This gap is much larger for BIPOC persons.
- → Failed to provide culturally safe, accessible and efficient, scholastic/social spaces for BIPOC youth.

## According to a longitudinal evaluation by the Boys & Girls Club Canada

- → Youth Support from grades K-12 move them in the direction of post-secondary education & beyond.
- → Increased academic confidence
- → Decreased aggression
- → Decreased truancy
- → Better work habits
- → Higher test scores
- → Better social skills



assistance to aspiring emerging BIPOC artists





#### Percentage of marginalized Canadian artists




Racial Wage Gap, Canada and the Provinces, 2010 (per cent)








#### The Ontario Arts Council **does not fund**:

- portfolios or promotional packages
- self-publishing (with the exception of artists' books)
- music videos (with the exception of professional live documentation of a performance)
- touring projects



# 24-hour sexual violence hotline
