Paramedic Referral to NE LHIN Home and Community Care

Identification of those failing to thrive in their home

Paramedic creates immediate referral for home services



Individual is offered supports required to live independently at home





Rapid Mobilization Table (RMT)

A partnership where representatives from various community agencies meet to provide immediate wrap around services to those at risk of harm.

- Encourages healthy lifestyle changes







Success to Date

2017:

- > 425 community referrals to services
- > 1077 one-to-one education sessions
- > 80 Shelters Patients
- 191 Paramedic referrals to NE LHIN HACC
- > CP@Clinic has proven a 2:1 return on investment
- Patient surveys show positive reviews and comments



Next Steps

- Continue health promotion initiatives and expand our services throughout CGS – Capreol – Lively – etc.
- Further develop our diversion programs so that we may continue diverting patients from the Emergency Department to appropriate services within our community.
- ➤ Participate in the CP@Home research program which targets frequent 911 callers with home visits and links to community services.



Health Promotion Community Paramedic Funding

Since 2014 Sudbury has been funded by the NE LHIN for 2 CP programs

The City of Greater Sudbury Paramedic Services funds the in-kind contributions of vehicle, management oversight and some medical supplies to these CP programs
